

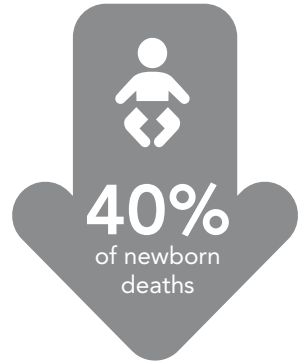
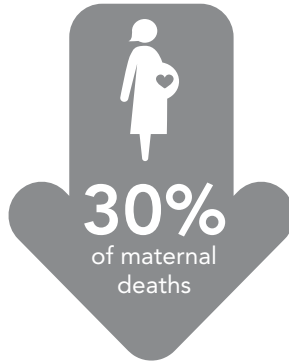
# The Case for Contraception
