Salematou Balde, Actuelles

As the Executive Director of the feminist organization Actuelles, Salematou is a graduate in audiovisual journalism. She is also the president of the Women and Resilience consortium and a member of the collective of Activists against Gender-Based Violence and the Ivorian League for Women's Rights. Salematou has been supporting activities focused on educating young girls on menstrual hygiene and promoting free distribution of hygienic protection kits in schools.
